Divine Mysteries: The Second Vatican Council

Orientalium Ecclesiarum – Decree on the Catholic Churches of the Eastern Rite

PREAMBLE

1. The Catholic Church holds in high esteem the institutions, liturgical rites, ecclesiastical traditions and the established standards of the Christian life of the Eastern Churches, for in them, distinguished as they are for their venerable antiquity, there remains conspicuous the tradition that has been handed down from the Apostles through the Fathers (1) and that forms part of the divinely revealed and undivided heritage of the universal Church. This Sacred Ecumenical Council, therefore, in its care for the Eastern Churches which bear living witness to this tradition, in order that they may flourish and with new apostolic vigor execute the task entrusted to them, has determined to lay down a number of principles, in addition to those which refer to the universal Church; all else is remitted to the care of the Eastern synods and of the Holy See. Healthcare Reform Must Respect Life

As our nation is considering new programs and laws relating to health care, it is important to keep certain values in mind, including that any system must:

- 1. Not fund abortion, assisted-suicide, or other forms of murder
- 2. Not fund contraception
- 3. Not fund services that include fertilization of embryos by unmarried donor sperm, or other forms of adultery or fornication
- 4. Not attack marriage by providing family benefits or packages to those in, so called, same-sex marriages or unions
- 5. Maintain the current legal requirement that medical professional provide the basic and reasonable medical and other care necessary to help those in need.

Handbook Study

Order of the Praesidium Meeting

This is the fourth in a series that seeks to discuss the order of the praesidium meeting. This issue we will discuss section 5, which reads:

The rosary is immediately followed by Spiritual Reading, to be given by the Spiritual Director (or in his absence by the President). Its duration should be limited to about five minutes. The choice of spiritual reading is free, but it is strongly recommended that at least during the early years of a praesidium the reading be taken from the handbook in order to familiarize the members with its contents and to stimulate them to study it seriously.

On the conclusion of the reading, it is the custom for the members to make, together, the sign of the cross.

"Without any doubt, Mary is worthy of blessing by the very fact that she became the mother of Jesus according to the flesh ('Blessed is the womb that bore you, and the breasts that you sucked'), but also and especially because already at the Annunciation she accepted the word of God, because she believed it, because she was obedient to God, and because she 'kept' the word and 'pondered it in her heart' (cf. Lk 1:38, 45; 2:19, 51) and by means of her whole life accomplished it. Thus we can say that the blessing proclaimed by Jesus is not in opposition, despite appearances, to the blessing uttered by the unknown woman, but rather coincides with that blessing in the persons of this Virgin Mother, who called herself only 'the handmaid of the Lord'." (RMat 20)

The first item of note is that the spiritual reading immediately follows the Rosary. The word *immediately* means that nothing should be said or inserted between the Rosary and the spiritual reading.

The next item of note is that the spiritual reading is to be given by the spiritual director. In his absence the president gives the reading. If both the president and the spiritual director are absent, the Vice President gives the reading. Given this, every effort should be taken to appoint to these positions persons able and willing to give the spiritual reading.

The reading continues, saying the length of the spiritual reading should be limited to about five minutes. Although some may think that longer readings will result in Legionaries being more informed about the Legion system, the opposite is the case. When the length of the reading begins to crowd-out other parts of the meeting, members end missing out on the learning that should take place during the discussion of works performed, the handbook study, the allocutio, and other important parts of the meeting. There is a delicate balance that must be made in the choice of readings. It is strongly suggested that the reading be taken from the Handbook, especially during the early years of a praesidium. However, this is not an absolute requirement 100 percent of the time. From time to time other readings may be appropriate. Other sources, which may be acceptable for more experienced praesidia include: *Some Handbook Reflections, Can We Be Saint*, and *True Devotion to Mary*. On the conclusion of the reading it is customary to make the sign of the cross. Thus, it is wise to not select a reading that is not appropriately ended by the making of the sign of the cross.

At the end of this reading we have a quote that requires some reflection. The quote discusses how Mary is worth of blessings both as the mother of Christ and because she was obedient to God. Why, one may ask, does this quote reside the chapter on the order of the meeting, in the section of the spiritual reading? There are no shortage high quality available quotes on the importance of spiritual reading, why a quote on how Mary is worthy of blessing?

In my opinion, the answer lies at the very core of what the devotional outlook of the Legion of Mary is and what one gains from the spiritual reading. Namely that the greater the faith in Mary, the more that Jesus will be loved, the more the Church will be exalted, the more sinners will be converted, the more sacraments will be frequented, and the greater the effort that will be put into evangelization. The spiritual reading is about Mary, and each and every rule, every doctrine, and every word in the Handbook is there to teach us about Mary and help us share in her blessings. It is not possible to learn about Jesus without learning

about Mary, nor is it possible to learn about Mary without learning about Jesus. As the Handbook says, quoting St. John Chrysostom:

"'Whoever does the will of God is my brother, and sister, and mother.' (Mk 3:35) What a marvel! What an honor! To what a height of glory Jesus elevates us! The women proclaim as most happy her who brought him into the world; but what prevents them from participating in that same maternity? For here the Gospel speaks of a new mode of generation, a new parenthood." (St. John Chrysostom)

Indeed, that is the goal of the Legion of Mary that we may be more like Mary, share in her blessings, and share in her maternity.

The beginning of the meeting serves as a wellspring of devotion. A uniform meeting, with a proper altar set-up, started on time with the opening prayers of the Legion of Mary, and followed with a proper spiritual reading will begin the meeting by fostering devotion to Mary and setting the stage for the external manifestation of that devotion during the meeting.

Even in cases where it may be obvious, it is a good practice to clearly explain during the allocutio how the spiritual reading teaches us more about Jesus and Mary. As the spirit of the Legion is that of Mary herself, Legionaries should take every effort to learn about Mary, including listening carefully to the spiritual readings and reflecting on both the spiritual readings and the allocutios given on them after the meeting has concluded.

Decree on the CATHOLIC CHURCHES OF THE EASTERN RITE

(CC from p. 1) THE INDIVIDUAL CHURCHES OR RITES

2. The Holy Catholic Church, which is the Mystical Body of Christ, is made up of the faithful who are organically united in the Holy Spirit by the same faith, the same sacraments and the same government and who, combining together into various groups which are held together by a hierarchy, form separate Churches or Rites. Between these there exists an admirable bond of union, such that the variety within the Church in no way harms its unity; rather it manifests it, for it is the mind of the Catholic Church that each individual Church or Rite should retain its traditions whole and entire and likewise that it should adapt its way of life to the different needs of time and place.(2)

3. These individual Churches, whether of the East or the West, although they differ somewhat among themselves in rite (to use the current phrase), that is, in liturgy, ecclesiastical discipline, and spiritual heritage, are, nevertheless, each as much as the others. entrusted to the pastoral government of the Roman Pontiff, the divinely appointed successor of St. Peter in primacy over the universal Church. They are consequently of equal dignity, so that none of them is superior to the others as regards rite and they enjoy the same rights and are under the same obligations, also in respect of preaching the Gospel to the whole world (cf. Mark 16, 15) under the guidance of the Roman Pontiff.

4. Means should be taken therefore in every part of the world for the protection and advancement of all the individual Churches and, to this end, there should be established parishes and a special hierarchy where the spiritual good of the faithful demands it. The hierarchs of the different individual Churches with jurisdiction in one and the same territory should, by taking common counsel in regular meetings, strive to promote unity of action and with common endeavor to sustain common tasks, so as better to further the good of religion and to safeguard more effectively the ordered way of life of the clergy.(3)

All clerics and those aspiring to sacred Orders should be instructed in the rites and especially in the practical norms that must be applied in interritual questions. The laity, too, should be taught as part of its catechetical education about rites and their rules.

Finally, each and every Catholic, as also the baptized of every non-Catholic church or denomination who enters into the fullness of the Catholic communion, must retain his own rite wherever he is, must cherish it and observe it to the best of his ability (4), without prejudice to the right in special cases of persons. communities or areas, of recourse to the Apostolic See, which, as the supreme judge of interchurch relations, will, acting itself or through other authorities, meet the needs of the occasion in an ecumenical spirit, by the issuance of opportune directives, decrees or rescripts.

PRESERVATION OF THE SPIRITUAL HERITAGE OF THE EASTERN CHURCHES

5. History, tradition and abundant ecclesiastical institutions bear outstanding witness to the great merit owing to the Eastern Churches by the universal Church.(5) The Sacred Council, therefore, not only accords to this ecclesiastical and spiritual heritage the high regard which is its due and rightful praise, but also unhesitatingly looks on it as the heritage of the universal Church. For this reason it solemnly declares that the Churches of the East, as much as those of the West, have a full right and are in duty bound to rule themselves, each in accordance with its own established disciplines, since all these are praiseworthy by reason of their venerable antiquity, more harmonious with the character of their faithful and more suited to the promotion of the good of souls.

6. All members of the Eastern Rite should know and be convinced that they can and should always preserve their legitimate liturgical rite and their established way of life, and that these may not be altered except to obtain for themselves an organic improvement. All these, then, must be observed by the members of the Eastern rites themselves. Besides, they should attain to on ever greater knowledge and a more exact use of them, and, if in their regard they have fallen short owing to contingencies of times and persons, they should take steps to return to their ancestral traditions.

Those who, by reason of their office or apostolic ministries, are in frequent communication with the Eastern Churches or their faithful should be instructed according as their office demands in the knowledge and veneration of the rites, discipline, doctrine, history and character of the members of the Eastern rites.(6) To enhance the efficacy of their apostolate, Religious and associations of the Latin Rite working in Eastern countries or among Eastern faithful are earnestly counseled to found houses or even provinces of the Eastern rite, as far as this can be done.(7)

EASTERN RITE PATRIARCHS

7. The patriarchate, as an institution, has existed in the Church from the earliest times and was recognized by the first ecumenical councils.(8)

By the name Eastern patriarch, is meant the bishop to whom belongs jurisdiction over all bishops, not excepting metropolitans clergy and people of his own territory or rite, in accordance with canon law and without prejudice to the primacy of the Roman Pontiff.(9)

Wherever an hierarch of any rite is appointed outside the territorial bounds of the patriarchate, he remains attached to the hierarchy of the patriarchate of that rite, in accordance with canon law.

8. Though some of the patriarchates of the Eastern Churches are of earlier and some of later date, nonetheless all are equal in respect of patriarchal dignity, without however prejudice to the legitimately established precedence of honor.(10)

9. By the most ancient tradition of the Church the patriarchs of the Eastern Churches are to be accorded special honor, seeing that each is set over his patriarchate as father and head. This Sacred Council, therefore, determines that from most early times in the Eastern Church their rights and privileges should be reestablished in accordance with the ancient tradition of each of the Churches and the decrees of the ecumenical councils.(11)

The rights and privileges in question are those that obtained in the time of union between East and West; though they should be adapted somewhat to modern conditions.

The patriarchs with their synods are the highest authority for all business of the patriarchate, including the right of establishing new eparchies and of nominating bishops of their rite within the territorial bounds of the patriarchate, without prejudice to the inalienable right of the Roman Pontiff to intervene in individual cases.

10. What has been said of patriarchs is valid also, in harmony with the canon law, in respect to major archbishops, who rule the whole of some individual church or rite.(12)

11. Seeing that the patriarchal office in the Eastern Church is a traditional form of government, the Sacred Ecumenical Council ardently desires that new patriarchates should be erected where there is need, to be established either by an ecumenical council or by the Roman Pontiff.(13)

THE DISCIPLINE OF THE SACRAMENTS

12. The Sacred Ecumenical Council confirms and approves the ancient discipline of the sacraments existing in the Oriental Churches, as also the ritual practices connected with their celebration and administration and ardently desires that this should be re-established if circumstances warrant it.

13. The established practice in respect of the minister of Confirmation that has obtained

should be fully restored. Therefore, priests validly confer this sacrament, using chrism blessed by a patriarch or a bishop.(14)

14. All Eastern Rite priests, either in conjunction with Baptism or separately from it, can confer this sacrament validly on all the faithful of any rite including the Latin; licitly, however, only if the regulations both of the common and the particular law are observed.(15) Priests, also, of Latin Rite, in accordance with the faculties they enjoy in respect of the administration of this sacrament, validly administer it also to the faithful of Eastern Churches; without prejudice to the rite, observing in regard to licitness the regulations both of the common and of the particular law.(16)

15. The faithful are bound to take part on Sundays and feast days in the Divine Liturgy or, according to the regulations or custom of their own rite, in the celebration of the Divine Office.(17) That the faithful may be able more easily to fulfill their obligation, it is laid down that the period of time within which the precept should be observed extends from the Vespers of the vigil to the end of the Sunday or the feast day.(18) The faithful are earnestly exhorted to receive Holy Communion on these days, and indeed more frequently-yes, even daily.(19)

16. Owing to the fact that the faithful of the different individual churches dwell intermingled with each other in the same area or Eastern territory, the faculties for hearing confessions duly and without restriction given to priests of any rite by their own hierarchs extend to the whole territory of him who grants them and also to the places and faithful of any other rite in the same territory, unless the

hierarch of the place has expressly excluded this for places of his rite.(20)

17. In order that the ancient established practice of the Sacrament of Orders in the Eastern Churches may flourish again, this Sacred Council ardently desires that the office of the permanent diaconate should, where it has fallen into disuse, be restored.(21) The legislative authorities of each individual church should decide about the subdiaconate and the minor orders and the rights and obligations that attach to them.(22)

18. To obviate invalid marriages when Eastern Catholics marry baptized Eastern non-Catholics and in order to promote fidelity in and the sanctity of marriage, as well as peace within the family, the Sacred Council determines that the canonical "form" for the celebration of these marriages is of obligation only for liceity; for their validity the presence of a sacred minister is sufficient, provided that other prescriptions of law are observed.(23)

DIVINE WORSHIP

19. It belongs only to an ecumenical council or to the Apostolic See to determine, transfer or suppress feast days common to all the Eastern Churches. On the other hand, to determine, transfer or suppress the feast days of any of the individual churches is within the competence not only of the Apostolic See but also of the patriarchal or archiepiscopal synod, due regard being had to the whole area and the other individual churches.(24)

20. Until such time as all Christians are agreed on a fixed day for the celebration of Easter, with a view meantime to promoting unity among the Christians of the same area or nation, it is left to the patriarchs or supreme authorities of a place to come to an agreement by the unanimous consent and combined Mary's Notebook Issue 34, August - September 2009

counsel of those affected to celebrate the feast of Easter on the same Sunday.(25)

21. Individual faithful dwelling outside the area or territory of their own rite may follow completely the established custom of the place where they live as regards the law of the sacred seasons. In families of mixed rite it is permissible to observe this law according to one and the same rite.(26)

22. Eastern clerics and Religious should celebrate in accordance with the prescriptions and traditions of their own established custom the Divine Office, which from ancient times has been held in high honor in all Eastern Churches.(27) The faithful too should follow the example of their forebears and assist devoutly as occasion allows at the Divine Office.

23. It belongs to the patriarch with his synod, or to the supreme authority of each church with the council of the hierarchs, to regulate the use of languages in the sacred liturgical functions and, after reference to the Apostolic See, of approving translations of texts into the vernacular.(28)

RELATIONS WITH THE BRETHREN OF THE SEPARATED CHURCHES

24. The Eastern Churches in communion with the Apostolic See of Rome have a special duty of promoting the unity of all Christians, especially Eastern Christians, in accordance with the principles of the decree, "About Ecumenism," of this Sacred Council, by prayer in the first place, and by the example of their lives, by religious fidelity to the ancient Eastern traditions, by a greater knowledge of each other, by collaboration and a brotherly regard for objects and feelings.(29) 25. If any separated Eastern Christian should, under the guidance of the grace of the Holy Spirit, join himself to the unity of Catholics, no more should be required of him than what a bare profession of the Catholic faith demands. Eastern clerics, seeing that a valid priesthood is preserved among them, are permitted to exercise the Orders they possess on joining the unity of the Catholic Church, in accordance with the regulations established by the competent authority.(30)

26. Common participation in worship (communicatio in sacris) which harms the unity of the Church or involves formal acceptance of error or the danger of aberration in the faith, of scandal and indifferentism, is forbidden by divine law.(32) On the other hand, pastoral experience shows clearly that, as regards our Eastern brethren, there should be taken into consideration the different cases of individuals, where neither the unity of the Church is hurt nor are verified the dangers that must be avoided, but where the needs of the salvation of souls and their spiritual good are impelling motives. For that reason the Catholic Church has always adopted and now adopts rather a mild policy, offering to all the means of salvation and an example of charity among Christians, through participation in the sacraments and in other sacred functions and things. With this in mind, "lest because of the harshness of our judgment we be an obstacle to those seeking salvation" (31) and in order more and more to promote union with the Eastern Churches separated from us, the Sacred Council lays down the following policy.

27. Without prejudice to the principles noted earlier, Eastern Christians who are in fact separated in good faith from the Catholic Church, if they ask of their own accord and have the right dispositions, may be admitted to the sacraments of Penance, the Eucharist and

the Anointing of the Sick. Further, Catholics may ask for these same sacraments from those non-Catholic ministers whose churches possess valid sacraments, as often as necessity or a genuine spiritual benefit recommends such a course and access to a Catholic priest is physically or morally impossible.(33)

28. Further, given the same principles, common participation by Catholics with their Eastern separated brethren in sacred functions, things and places is allowed for a just cause.(34)

29. This conciliatory policy with regard to "communicatio in sacris" (participation in things sacred) with the brethren of the separated Eastern Churches is put into the care and control of the local hierarchs, in order that, by combined counsel among themselves and, if need be, after consultation also with the hierarchs of the separated churches, they may by timely and effective regulations and norms direct the relations among Christians.

CONCLUSION

30. The Sacred Council feels great joy in the fruitful zealous collaboration of the Eastern and the Western Catholic Churches and at the same time declares: All these directives of law are laid down in view of the present situation till such time as the Catholic Church and the separated Eastern Churches come together into complete unity.

Meanwhile, however, all Christians, Eastern as well as Western, are earnestly asked to pray to God fervently and assiduously, nay, indeed daily, that, with the aid of the most holy Mother of God, all may become one. Let them pray also that the strength and the consolation of the Holy Spirit may descend copiously upon all those many Christians of whatsoever church they be who endure suffering and deprivations



for their unwavering avowal of the name of Christ.

"Love one another with fraternal charity, anticipating one another with honor". (Rom.12,10.)

Each and all these matters which are set forth in this decree have been favorably voted on by the Fathers of the Council. And we, by the apostolic authority given us by Christ and in union with the Fathers, approve, decree and



establish them in the Holy Spirit and command that they be promulgated for the glory of God.



Legion Spirit

The Legion Apostolate

The following is the allocutio given at the July 2009, Concilium meeting by Fr. Bede McGregor O.P., the Spiritual Director to the Legion of Mary



In nearly every diocese in the Church where the Legion is present there are renewal programs, adult education courses, calls to evangelization, new ecclesial movements, new ministries, a multiplication of new structures in parishes and dioceses and no small multiplication of reports, meetings and ever more new committees. Every new agenda is tagged as urgent and important. And the Legion is often asked to participate in all this activity and planning. The Legion desires with every instinct of its soul to collaborate with everything that may serve the cause of Christ and His Church. But the question can arise: what is the best way the Legion can contribute to the parish, the diocese or indeed to the universal Church? What should we opt into and what should we opt out of?

Well, I think the best contribution we can make at every level in the Church and to every new initiative of any ecclesial body is to be faithful to our own Legion charism. We must always be fully Legionaries in every situation of time and place. To be steeped in the Handbook and to truly live the spirit of the Handbook is already to offer a profound contribution to any and every Christian community we are part of. We will be at our best when we are true to our Legion identity.

In the context of the overwhelming multiplicity and diversity of demands made on the Legion, I would like to reflect once again on one or two of the cardinal points of the Legion Apostolate. Fr. Thomas O' Flynn, a former Spiritual Director of Concilium, when preaching at the month's mind Mass for our Founder referred to a quotation from an article of Frank Duff that went as follows:

Mary's Notebook

'Vocation to the apostolate begins the moment you realize that apart from the salvation of souls nothing else in life matters very much ... and you begin to act accordingly.' Then he adds: 'That sentence - it seems to me - contains the mainspring of everything he thought, every thing he said and everything he did.'

It also puts into words everything that can be said of the Legion Apostolate. We are in the business of saving souls and nothing else. We do not get involved precisely as legionaries in collecting funds or distributing them. There are other organizations for that. Every meeting, every activity, every discussion in the Legion ultimately must have the salvation of souls in view. That is the meaning and message of the life of our founder for us today.

There is no greater charity than to pray and work ceaselessly for the salvation of souls. What is the point of getting everything we want and need in this life if we do not get into heaven for eternity? Pope Benedict told the youth of the world to keep an eye on eternity. That is the kind of thinking behind the Legion commitment to seek out and talk to every soul. We must speak with love to rich and poor, good and bad, educated and uneducated, young and old, healthy and sick, happy people and lonely people, in short, no one must be excluded from legionary outreach and apostolic love. We are not

simply geared to a one off apostolic program but week in and week out, year in and year out we are always on duty for the salvation of souls. We legionaries must be experts in the follow-up of souls. Infinite patience and sweetness must be lavished on a priceless soul as the Handbook puts it.

But there is another cardinal point with regard to the Legion Apostolate. It is not sufficient to have a great zeal for the salvation of souls. It is equally important to stress how we engage in our Legion work. It is pivotal that we have burned into our very soul the principle that the Handbook puts so simply: Souls are not approached except with Mary. The joy of our Legion work must be the spirit of Mary herself.

We can grow tired of the sacrifice involved in faithfulness to meetings, apparent failure or difficult situations, dryness of spirit, lack of response, the sheer load of demands made on our time and energy. But a legionary is never alone. He has Mary always at his side, it is her work and she asks us to be her living presence with every soul we meet. We don't do any work without her. She makes everything worthwhile. Gradually we come to see our Legion apostolate and vocation not as a burden but as a great gift and privilege. Mary gives herself to us and that is enough. She leads us to Jesus and she brings souls to Him through our courageous and generous Legion work
